Gospel Reflection

In this week's Gospel, Jesus urges us to live with vigilance and generosity, reminding us that our true treasure is not found in possessions but in a heart oriented toward God. "Do not be afraid, little flock," He begins—an intimate reassurance that we are not alone in the uncertainties of life. Instead of storing up riches that decay, we are invited to store up treasure in heaven through acts of love, mercy, and service.

Jesus compares our lives to servants awaiting their master's return, encouraging us to remain ready, faithful, and alert. This readiness is not marked by fear, but by joyful expectation and a life lived with purpose. The message is clear: the more we are given—whether in time, talent, or responsibility—the more is expected of us. This passage calls us to examine where our treasure truly lies. Are we attentive stewards of what God has entrusted to us? Christ asks for hearts undivided, awake to His presence and responsive to the needs of others. In the end, it is faithfulness in the small things that prepares us for the Kingdom.

August 15 Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Church celebrates the Assumption as the moment when Mary, the Mother of God, was taken body and soul into heavenly glory at the end of her earthly life. dogma, This solemnly defined by Pope Pius XII in 1950, affirms the special role Mary holds in salvation history and the hope of resurrection promised to all the faithful. The Assumption is both a sign of the Church's future glory and a reminder of our call to holiness. It is a Holy Day of Obligation, inviting us to gather in iov and thanksgiving for God's triumph in Mary's life. What to do on this day:

Attend Mass, pray the Rosary with a focus on the Glorious Mysteries, reflect on Mary's "yes" to God, and honour her by acts of charity or by visiting the Grotto of Our Lady of the Fields.

August 14 Memorial of St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe, Priest and Martyr

"The most deadly poison of our time is indifference."

Born in Poland in 1894, Saint Maximilian Kolbe was a Franciscan priest with a profound devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. As a young man, he had a vision of the Virgin offering him two crowns one white for purity and one red for martyrdom — and he accepted them both. He founded movement dedicated to promoting the Gospel through Mary's intercession. and boldly used modern media, including printing presses and radio, to spread the faith worldwide. Arrested by the Nazis during World War II for sheltering refugees, he was sent to Auschwitz. In 1941, when a fellow prisoner was condemned to death, Maximilian stepped forward to take his place, offering his life out of love. He spent his final days in the starvation bunker leading prayers and comforting the others before dying by lethal injection on August 14. He is remembered as a martyr of charity and the patron saint of journalists, prisoners, and the prolife movement.


